The exhibition, which marks the 25th anniversery of the Danish Institute at Athens, comprises works by three Danish artists, whose pictures, ceramic unica and woven textiles explore the grammar and syntax of geometry from the past to the present.

Classical geometry evolved in Greece about 2500 years ago, but archaeological finds show that geometry already made its mark on Aegean art at a far earlier date, and there are innumerable later examples of this: from the ceramics of everyday life to the severe architecture of temples. In post-antique times, Greek geometry became the foundation of numerous artistic and scientific inventions.

Science and art are also key concepts for the Danish Institute at Athens, where the exhibited works are shown in dialogue with photographs of ancient and modern artefacts, such as Greek vases with geometric ornaments or machine-like objects seen against the movements of light.
